
We are pleased to announce that **The Tia Foundation has served its 100,000th villager during our launch** on October 17<sup>th</sup>, to be

In the October 13<sup>th</sup> issue Connie Sexton, a reporter for The Arizona Republic, featured Tia's President, Laura Libman. The beautifully written article, "How One Trip to Mexico Changed 100,000 Lives", is part of an ongoing series in Best Life. It summarizes how Laura transitioned from

aerospace knowledge engineering to international healthcare development. We are grateful to Connie and The Arizona Republic for drawing attention to our life-saving mission.

During Tia's project last month, we trained our 259<sup>th</sup> community health worker. Fourteen of the most recent graduate Promotoras, with the help of the PMC brigade, were able to get their feet wet by providing care to a group of Nahuatl children with a fungal skin infection from a nearby village. Not only that, but they were able to identify the cause of the infection and advise them how to avoid becoming infected again. Incidents like this epitomize the valuable aid these dedicated women bring to their communities on a consistent basis.
